

**PIONEER RESIDENT OF COUNTY
DIES AT DAUGHTER'S HOME**

**Frederick Kuhn Passes Away at
Mason City After Five Months'
Illness—Buried at Greenwood**

Frederick Kuhn, a pioneer resident of Chickasaw county, passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. F. A. Hill in Mason City, on Tuesday, Sept. 9, 1930, after an illness of five months.

Deceased was born in Germany January 14, 1842, and came with his parents to this country in 1848, settling on a farm near Lancaster, Wis., where he grew to young manhood. In 1861 he enlisted in the 9th Wisconsin Vol. Infantry and served with the Union army until January 30, 1866, when he received an honorable discharge.

In 1867 he came to Ionia Iowa, and settled on a farm near that town. He improved it for a home and in 1871 he returned to Lancaster and on March 28 of that year he was united in marriage to Helen Smith. Returning to Ionia, they lived happily on the same farm for thirty-two years, or until 1903, when they purchased a home in Nashua where they lived until the death of the devoted wife in 1916, after which Mr. Kuhn went to Mason City to make his home with his adopted daughter, Mrs. F. A. Hill.

Seven children were born to this union, all of whom died in infancy except one son, Arthur E., who died at the age of five years. He is survived by his adopted daughter, Mrs. Fred Hill, near Mason City, and one brother, Emery, in California, and numerous nieces and nephews.

Since the death of his wife, with the exception of a few winters spent in Springfield, Mo., he had made his home with his adopted daughter, where, during his last illness he received every care that loving hands could administer. He was a patient sufferer during his long illness. He was a kind and loving father to the little girl he took to care for in 1875, and the memory of his kindness can never be effaced from her mind. There is a vacant place at her table and a vacant place in her home that can never be filled.

Funeral services were held at the Patterson Funeral Home in Mason City on Thursday, Sept. 11, conducted by Rev. William Dibble, and interment was made in Greenwood cemetery at Nashua the same afternoon. Committal service was conducted by Rev. William Kent, pastor of Nashua Congregational church.
