

**ANOTHER PIONEER CALLED.****Marvin Potter Answers Final Summons After Long Illness.**

Marvin Potter, a long time and highly respected resident of this community passed away at his home in this city last Thursday evening at 9:30 after an illness extending over a considerable period of time, and death came as a relief to a worn out body.

Deceased was born May 5, 1833, in Franklyn county, N. Y. On Nov. 3, 1858, he was united in marriage to Arvilla Clark in Franklyn county N. Y., and to this union twin sons were born, Hermon W., and Hamon O., both of whom survive. In August, 1862, he enlisted as captain of the 142d New York Volunteers and served during the civil war. After his discharge, in August, 1865, he came west with his wife and they located on a farm at Horton, in Bremer county, where they resided until 1900 when they moved to Nashua. His wife preceded him to the better land May 1, 1912. Besides the two sons he is also survived by one brother, L. F. Potter, of this city. Two brothers Andrew and Warren, served in his company during the war, and both preceded him in death.

Mr. Potter was a man of high moral character and was respected and honored by all who knew him, and besides the relatives his death will be mourned by a wide circle of friends.

He is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. Sarah Hulbert, of Horton, and Mrs. J. M. Miller, of Waverly. One sister died a number of years ago.

The funeral was held from the home Saturday at 1:30 p. m., Rev. Geo. W. Geivin, of the Baptist church, officiating and the burial was at Oak Hill cemetery.

The burial service was in charge of Geo. W. S. Dodge Post G. A. R., of which deceased was an honored member.
