

H. H. Chapin Passes Away.

H. H. Chapin, a well known and respected citizen of Nashua, passed away at his home at 2:30 last Sunday morning, in the 75th year of his age. Death was due to heart trouble and Bright's disease, from which he had suffered for several months.

Horace H. Chapin was born in Westmoreland, Oneida county, New York, May 26, 1839. While a mere child his parents moved to Wisconsin, settling at Ixonia, near Watertown, where he grew to manhood. When the war broke out he enlisted in the fall of 1861 in the 16th Wisconsin infantry, serving the full term of his enlistment and on his discharge in 1866 he re-enlisted and served ten months more. After the war he returned to his home and on New Year's day, 1886, he was married to Miss Mariah C. Perry. They lived at home two years then moved to Waushara, Wis., where they lived eight years, coming to Iowa in 1876. They took up their residence on a farm a few miles west of Nashua, where they lived for 34 years, when they retired from active life and moved to Nashua, which has been their home for the past three years. Three daughters were born to them, one, Mildred, dying in 1890 at the age of 18 years. The two surviving are Mrs. Loretta Thompson, of Charles City and Mrs. Martha White, of this

city. Deceased was converted in 1891 and was a member of the Congregational church at the time of his death. He was a consistent christian and a faithful member of his church. During his service for his country he was wounded in the breast and carried the bullet for years, suffering continually. He was a member of Geo. W. S. Dodge Post, G. A. R. and his comrades gathered at the funeral to pay the last honors to his remains.

The funeral service was held from the home Tuesday at 2 p. m. conducted by his former pastor, Rev. A. W. Sinden, of Reinbeck, and interment was in Greenwood cemetery.
