

### DECEASED FOR ANOTHER VETERAN OF CIVIL WAR

#### Hamblin, For Forty Years a Resident of Nashua, Dies at Sol- diers' Home—Funeral Here

Henry Hamblin, a pioneer resident of Nashua, and a veteran of the Civil war, passed away Tuesday, March 12, 1930, at the Soldiers' Home in Nashua, where he had been a resident for five years. He had been in poor health since August of last year.

Hamblin was born in Ohio on March 10, 1840, and would have been 90 years of age next October.

As a young boy he moved with his parents to Wisconsin, where he grew to manhood, and when the Civil war broke out he enlisted in the Union army in the 10th Wisconsin Infantry, and served until the close of the war and was honorably discharged. During his service he was shot over the head by a gun and was injured permanent-

ly. He moved from Reedsville, Wis., to Iowa, where he lived two years, and then to Charles City, where he resided six years and then to Nashua, which was his home for forty years.

Hamblin was twice married, his first marriage being to Miss Clara Clemens, and the second to Miss Maryette Roberts. Both wives having preceded his death. One son, Clyde, was born in the first union, and lives in

Nashua. His body, accompanied by the son, was brought to Nashua by Underlandt and funeral services were held at the Methodist Church, Nashua, at 2 p. m., Rev. E. E. Underlandt officiating. Members of the American Legion post acted as casket bearers. Interment was at Oak Hill cemetery.

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
