**had C. F. Jones Answers Final Summons.**

Calvin F. Jones, a pioneer resident of this community, passed away at his home in Nashua about 6 o'clock last Friday morning. He had been in very poor health for a number of years, at times confined to his bed and again he would be up and around. About ten days ago he took to his bed and gradually grew worse. On Thursday evening it was seen that the end was approaching and messages were sent summoning the absent children home but before their arrival the angel of death had released him from his long weary struggle against pain and disease.

Deceased was born May 15, 1843 in Rensselaer county, N. Y., where he lived until twelve years of age when he moved with his parents to McHenry county, Ill. When 18 years of age he responded to the call of his country and enlisted in the 36th Illinois Volunteers and was honorably discharged at the end of three years' service but re-enlisted in Company H, 147th Illinois Volunteers. He participated in the battles at Pea Ridge, Perryville, Stone River, Chickamauga, Mission Ridge, Kenewa Mountain, Atlanta, Franklin, Nashville and Vicksburg. At the battle of Stone River he was wounded twice and his brother at his side was killed in the bayonet charge. At the close of the war he came with his parents to Riverton township, Floyd county, Iowa, and from that time on this vicinity had been his home. He was married July 5, 1868, to Miss Hannah Young and to this union six children were born, namely: Mrs. Nora Jepson, of Glyndon, Minn., George E., of Dilworth, Minn., Alva E. of Nashua, Walter E., of Farwo, N. D., Lamont E. and Carl F., of Nashua, all of whom were present at the funeral service.

As a citizen Mr. Jones stood high in the esteem of all who were privileged to know him. He was an active christian worker during the years that his health would permit and was one of the principal factors in the organization and upbuilding of the Baptist society of this city, contributing liberally of his means and time to the erection of the church edifice. In his home life he was a father that his children can rise up and call blessed and a faithful companion to the loving wife who was constantly at his side responding to every wish during his long years of sickness and suffering. Death had no sting for him. He was ready and waiting for the Master's call and when he realized that the end was near he made all preparation for the funeral, selecting his pall bearers, the music and arranging other details as he wished them to be.

Besides the wife and children mentioned above deceased is survived by two brothers, Henry, of Bradford, and C. E., of Waterloo, and two sisters, Mrs. A. J. Johnson, of Cedar Fall, and Mrs. Wm. Fuller, of Monticello.

The funeral services were held Sunday at 2 p. m. in the Baptist church, conducted by Rev. Kirwin, and were attended by a very large concourse of sorrowing relatives and friends. Interment was in Oak Hill cemetery.
