

ZINE KNIGHT ANSWERS TAPS.

Was Pioneer Citizen of Community
and Soldier in Civil War—Funer-
al Held Tuesday.

Zine C. Knight, another of Nashua's aged and respected citizens, passed away early Sunday morning at Independence where he had gone to receive treatment, and the remains were brought back to his home in this city Monday evening.

Mr. Knight had been an invalid for some time, the past several months being in mental darkness. He was given the tenderest care possible by his wife and children and it was not until the last couple weeks that they would consent to his being taken to the hospital.

The funeral service was conducted from the Congregational church Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, Rev. Tuttle officiating, and interment was made in Oak Hill. The following obituary notice was read at the service:

Zine C. Knight was born in the state of New York in 1844. At the age of 4 years, with his parents, he moved to Bureau county, Illinois, where they resided until the war of the rebellion broke out. Being filled with boyish ardor and love of country he enlisted in the early stages of the war. Not being of military age, his father succeeded in getting him released from the army, but immediately after becoming of proper age he re-enlisted and marched with Sherman to the sea.

June 29, 1868, he was united in marriage to Marion Smith, of Walnut, Bureau county, Illinois, to whom ten children were born, seven still living: Leonard, of New Hampton; Leverne, of Waverly; Herbert and Walter, of Toppenish, Wash.; Duwane and Cecil, of Nashua; Mrs. Harry Limbert, of Waterloo, and three whom have passed to the better land, Mrs. Clara Owen, Mrs. Edna Billings and little Hazel.

A kind and indulgent father, a loving husband has left us. We deeply feel his loss, but rejoice that he is free from sorrow and pain.

Dearest father thou hast left us,
Here thy loss we deeply feel;
But 'tis God that has bereft us,
He will all our sorrows share.
