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THOMAS MINER

Thomas Eugene Miner was born at Swanton, Vt., June 30, 1834, and died at his home in Nashua June 7, 1906, aged 71 years, 9 months and 9 days.

He was married to Miss Phebe A. Hall, July 9, 1853. To this union eight children were born, three of whom preceded the father to the spirit land. In the year of 1898, Jan. 24, his wife died, and in August 29, 1900, he was united in marriage to Miss E. A. Usher, the bereft and sorrowing wife. Mr. Miner was an old soldier. He enlisted in Company B, 118th Regiment, New York Volunteers, and served one year and a half, which brought him to the close of the war. He received an honorable discharge and came to Nashua in 1865, where he has lived most of the forty years since the close of the war.

For two years Mr. Miner had not enjoyed good health, but the past six weeks he began to fail and the end came quickly. His suffering at times was intense, but he was a patient sufferer and grateful for any little deed of kindness done for him.

He was a Christian and was converted some seventeen or eighteen years ago and united with the M. E. church at Frederika, but at a later date his membership was transferred from Frederika to the M. E. church of Nashua. He was a hard working man, a kind husband and father, and a good neighbor and citizen. But his days have been numbered, his labor is ended, the battle of life has been fought and in the name of his Divine Master he has won.

He leaves a wife, three sons, two daughters, and six grandchildren to mourn their loss.

The funeral was held at the M. E. church Saturday, at 2 p. m., Rev. Piper officiating, and the remains were interred in Greenwood cemetery.
