A PIONEER RESIDENT DIES.

**James Notton, For More Than Fifty
Years a Citizen Here Passed to
His Final Reward Sunday.**

James Notton, for nearly fifty-four years a resident of this community, passed away at his home in Nashua Sunday after a lingering illness at the age of 85 years, 5 months and 24 days.

James Notton, son of John and Mary Notton, was born at Burton-Bradstock, England, February 23, 1834, and died at his home in Nashua August 17, 1919.

At the age of 16 years he enlisted in the English navy, serving his country for a period of seven years. In 1857 he came to America, locating near Wingville, Wis. At the outbreak of the Civil war he enlisted in Co. K, 33rd Wisconsin, serving two and a half years and was discharged for disability resulting from sunstroke received while taking part in the famous campaign up the Red River under General Banks. In 1865 he moved to Iowa, locating near Nashua, where he has made his home for nearly fifty-four years. On Aug. 23, 1863, he was united in marriage to Emily M. Folks, of Annaton, Wis. To this union was born seven children, four sons and three daughters. Of these six remain to mourn their loss. One son, William G., died Oct. 3, 1893. Those remaining are: Chas. Notton, of Vicksburg, Miss., Mary Copp, of Shawmut, Mont., and Robert, Edith, Minnie and Elmer, all of Nashua. He is also survived by his wife.

Mr. Notton had been an invalid for over thirty years but it was not until about seven weeks ago that he gave up and took to his bed. Death came as a welcome relief to his suffering and his spirit passed peacefully to that world where there is no sickness or suffering.

Funeral services were held at the home Wednesday at 2:30 p. m., Rev. H. D. Green officiating, and interment was in the family lot at Greenwood.
