

Stephen S. Tynge Dead.

Died, at his home in Bradford, Sunday, July 9, from dropsy and heart failure, Mr. Stephen Tynge, aged 74 years, 3 months, and 9 days. Mr. Tynge had been ailing for some time, and while it was thought he was not long for this world the end wasn't expected to be so near. He was up and around on the morning of the day of his death.

Stephen Stanford Tynge was born in Middlebury, Vt., Oct. 21, 1830. He served in the war of 1861-65.

until his death. He served his country as a volunteer during the war of the rebellion, responding to Lincoln's second call for troops. He enlisted in Co. K., 35th Massachusetts regiment, and remained with that organization until the end of the war, being present at the surrender of Gen. Lee to Gen. Grant at Appomattox. He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. E. M. Givens, of Minneapolis, besides the sorrowing wife. Mr. Tynge was of a quiet disposition, a good neighbor, and a constant friend.

The funeral was held from the home at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, Rev. Walter Piper officiating, and the remains were interred in Greenwood. Geo. W. S. Dodge Post G. A. R., of which the deceased was a member, attended in a body.
