

### Chas. Weusthoff Expires Suddenly.

Something after the manner of the passing away a number of weeks ago of his son, Charles, Charles Weusthoff died suddenly at his home about 5 o'clock Saturday evening. For the past few months Mr. Weusthoff has been gradually going down hill, although it might not have been noticed by the casual observer, and had become very weak physically. At the hour spoken of he was sitting in his chair when supper was announced. He started as if to get up, but sank back again, and then it was noticed that there was something wrong. A physician was summoned without delay and, although the dying man was still alive when he arrived, death followed soon after his being removed to the bed. Death was due to apoplexy.

The deceased had been for many years a resident of this city and so was very well known. He was a man of quiet disposition, was a good husband and father, and a faithful friend. He served during the civil war with fidelity to the union cause and was much respected by his fellow members of Geo. W. S. Dodge Post, who followed in a body his remains to their last resting place. His age was 84 years. He is survived by his faithful wife, one daughter, Miss Ella, who is employed in Charles City, and four sons, Frank, of Waverly, Ed, of Waterloo, and Will and John, whose whereabouts are unknown.

The funeral was held from the German Lutheran church on Monday afternoon, Rev. Duerschner, of Ionia, officiating, and the remains were laid to rest in Greenwood cemetery.
